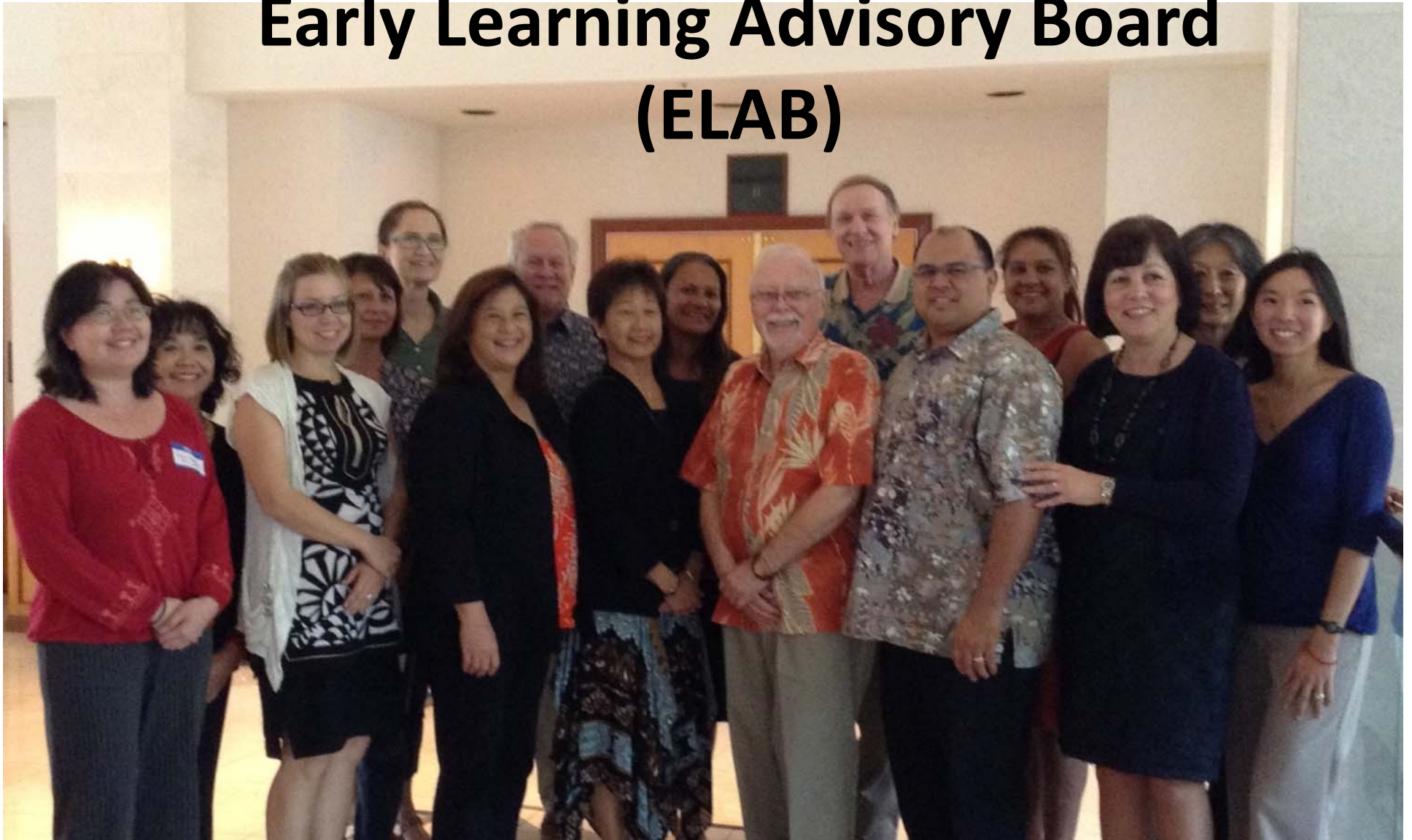

About The Early Learning Advisory Board



Review of Act 178:

- ▶ Established the Executive Office on Early Learning to guide the development of an integrated and comprehensive statewide early childhood development and learning system.
- ▶ Established the Early Learning Advisory Board to replace the Early Learning Council

Early Learning Advisory Board's (ELAB) ROLES

- ▶ Be an **independent voice** for children's health, safety, development and learning
- ▶ **Advise** the **Executive Office on Early Learning (EOEL)** on how best to meet the needs of children prenatal to Kindergarten through its **Action Strategy**
- ▶ **Promote collaboration** across agencies and stakeholders serving young children
- ▶ **Provide recommendations** to improve quality, access, and coordination of Early Childhood programs

ELAB Organization

- **Public and private** voting members
 - *Represent state departments and agencies*
- Elected Chair and appointed Vice Chair



How ELAB Functions

- **Board meetings every other month**
- **Agenda Format:**
 - EOEL work
 - Early Childhood Strategic Actions
 - Information sharing
 - Member updates
 - Public comment
- **Endorsement of initiatives, etc. as requested by EOEL**



How ELAB Functions

continued

- **Review relevant legislation for support and/or testimony**
- **Review subcommittee reports for input/advice**
- **Support public information efforts promoting value of early learning investment (i.e. Be My Voice Campaign)**

SCHOOL READINESS PROGRAM 2014

Three methods to increase capacity and provide access to children:

1. Preschool Open Doors funded through DHS to attend private preschools
2. DOE-EOEL partnership to create a 4-year-old program on DOE campuses
3. Family Child Interaction Learning programs to support families in preparing children



Family-child Interaction Learning Programs

- Parents, family members and caregivers attend the school readiness program with their child
- Families learn strategies for improving school readiness alongside their children

- ✓ Program Manager, to oversee contracts



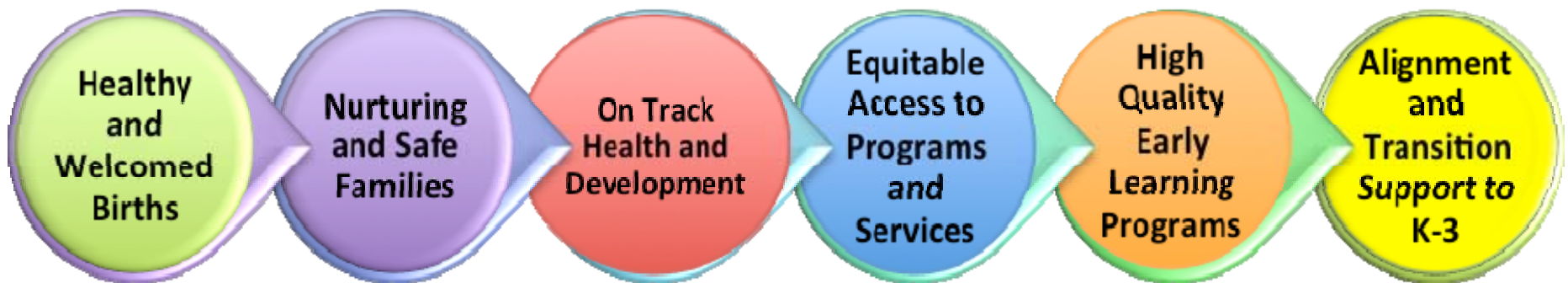
ELAB Support for EOEL's Action Strategy
