Summer extension courses offered by the MEd ECE Program are offered at resident tuition rate for all students and do not include an additional Manoa student fee. Students taking regular Mānoa offerings for electives during the academic year can expect to be assessed a separate student fee and non-resident students will pay the higher non-resident tuition for courses taken during the academic year.
