HCYC is currently working on a Trainer Registry and a Training Approval System. Kathy then updated the ELB on the Power to the Profession Initiative, including a number of documents related to this: A graphic depicting the Early Childhood Education Profession within the Early Childhood Field; Decision Cycles 3-5; a pilot Questionnaire to help policy makers focus on workforce issues, and a report entitled “Uncovering the Inner Workings of States’ Early Childhood Policies” based on the questionnaire piloted in Indiana, New York and Wisconsin.</p>	<p>survey from NAEYC.</p>
<p>Charter School Pre-School Supplemental Grant – Deanne Goya</p>	<p>Deanne provided an update on the federal Preschool Supplemental Grant which was awarded to HI (Charter School Commission) recently (\$1,375,218). Workforce development was the primary focus of the proposal submitted to enable PDG Pre-K, EOEL Pre-K, and private EC entities to access early childhood courses, with priority given to educational assistants and then teachers. A second focus is on developing a multi-media campaign to both promote the sustaining of Charter School Pre-K classrooms through a funding ask in the 2019 legislative session, as well as to develop a public education campaign on the value of high quality early childhood experiences. Other workforce building efforts focused on in the grant proposal included increasing Hawaii’s cadre of CLASS certified trainers and of ECERS-3 certified observers. Deanne announced that members could sign up for more information and requested that ELB create a committee to serve as advisory for the multi-media project.</p> <p>Comments provided: (1) Avoid duplication of PATCH scholarships; (2) Be clear on who the audience is for the public education campaign; (3) Within any training/education efforts for the WF, ongoing support (coaching, mentoring, observations) is needed, even as staff get degrees or take classes.</p>	<p>Formation of an advisory committee as a support for the multi-media project to convey the message of the importance of early learning, and to increase parent awareness of the different early learning options available to help drive demand.</p>

<p>EOEL Update ---Lauren Moriguchi</p>	<p>Lauren reviewed several documents distributed to the ELB.</p> <p>“Quality Matters in Pre-K” (EOEL brief): using this with legislators to increase awareness of the value of early learning and the balance needed between number of slots and workforce development. The EOEL is training and providing ongoing support to administrators and teaching staff through the Early Learning Academy and the newly created Induction Program for long term results.</p> <p>Legislative Report: EOEL is working on increasing the number of NIEER benchmarks it can meet. The report also describes EOEL’s plan for expansion and its supplemental budget request justification for SY 2019.</p> <p>(Question: Will Charter schools come under EOEL at some point for sustainability if the Legislature does not fund them beyond the 2018-19 school year? This will need further discussion.)</p> <p>Appropriation of funds for FCIL: EOEL is working on a contract to procure FCIL services. Funds were just released in mid-December by the Governor’s Office (\$300 K with a 10% restriction) for SY 2018. EOEL to put out an RFP and anticipates a 3 month period before the contract can be executed. Because this will be so close to the end of the 2018 SY, will need to encumber the funds by June 30, 2018 in order to carry them over to provide services in the 2019 SY.</p> <p>EOEL has been asked to create a concept paper by Kamehameha Schools and the DOE to support universal Pre-K and DOE’s proposal to build an early learning lab. Superintendent wants to move Pre-K into the DOE system for a Pre-K to 12 construct.</p>	
<p>Member Updates—Bob</p>	<p>Home Visiting (Edel): The former Hawaii Home Visiting Network is</p>

In November, it served 535 families, with a desired outcome of serving 734 families.</p> <p>DHS (Dana): Dana announced the open application period for Preschool Open Doors for the 2018-2019 school year.</p> <p>HAIS (Bob): HAIS is sponsoring a free workshop on challenging behaviors in young children on Hawaii Island at the Kamehameha Schools campus. Information is on the HAIS website.</p>	
<p>Facilitated Discussion of Board Work – Leslie Mullens</p>	<p>Leslie’s contract with the ELB has been extended for an additional 40 hours (January to April) in order to support ELB’s planning around its new governance role.</p> <p>Leslie reviewed content that was discussed at the previous meeting, including ELB’s evolutionary path and next steps actions needed to be taken. Work groups that were formed at the December meeting (Vision/Mission, Guiding Principles, and Conflict Norms) were to have convened between December and January.
